During this transition, this summary document lists the District Grants currently submitted and in the process of review and approval. We share this list so that other clubs can see the kind of projects in the works, and perhaps choose one to join, or to emulate in their own community.

The next deadline for submission of District Grants is June 30, 2025.

Global grants take longer to assemble, review, and gain approval. There is no set deadline for beginning discussion of a global grant project. It is best to begin early, discuss your idea with the community you intend to serve, do a careful “needs assessment,” and engage the help of one or more “host clubs” in the area to be served.

Global Grants

Helping Brazilian Immigrant Children in Hudson MA School (Basic Education and Literacy) (Rotary Club of Hudson, with Rotary Clubs in Brazil) – DRAFT, seeking partners, Contact Sidney Browning

There is a flourishing community of Portuguese-Americans in Hudson, Massachusetts, who came over beginning in 1886 from the Azores, seeking work. In the last decade a new wave of Brazilian immigrants has been attracted to Hudson because of the support of this Portuguese-speaking community. While the schools in Hudson have been welcoming of this influx of school age children, it presents challenges both to the children and to the teachers to learn English and become successful in school alongside native speakers of English. This grant is being organized to provide support to the schools in facilitating this acculturation and language learning. The grant is being originated in Brazil, with Hudson as the recipient of the grant funding.

Family Support: Loved Ones Struggling with Addiction (Vocational Training) - GG2568019 (Rotary Club of Nashoba Valley) – DRAFT, seeking partners, Contact Mary Garcia

Training caretakers both clinicians and non clinicians using the Invitation To change (ITC) model, equip caretakers with skills to better understand addictions so they don't give up on their loved ones in a sustainable way.

To teach caretakers about the chronic nature of addiction, a brain condition characterized by remission and relapse.

To train caretakers the different modalities of safe care to mitigate burn out and care fatigue.

To reduce stigma by teaching better communication skills to improve interactions and maximize caretaker influence on tighter loved ones

Primarily the addicts are the main beneficiaries of this training , the secondary beneficiaries are the caretakers. Tertiary beneficiaries are the community and at large such as financial burden and death associated with the disease.

***Clinic in Matugga Uganda (Maternal and Child Health) - GG2567895
(Rotary Club of Wachusett Area) -- DRAFT, seeking partners. Contact Savvas Fotiadis***

Under the Ugandan Healthcare system, a need was established through community assessment that a level III facility with maternal and child healthcare services was needed in the urban center of Matugga which has a population of 23,000. An existing clinic operated by Angels of Hope (AoH) was not meeting the medical needs of the community and was not properly equipped for the desired services. The project seeks to establish a new clinic with adequate space in a building owned by AoH to increase the medical services provided to the town of Matugga and the surrounding area for a majority of residents, who cannot afford the cost of such healthcare. The new clinic will include a Birthing Center to serve the needs of pregnant women.

Our expectations are to serve over 500 patients per month.

Who would benefit: Everyone in the area. All elderly people as well as the lower-income families will be provided with free care. For those that can afford to pay will be charged a fee depending on their ability to make the clinic sustainable.

***Clean Water for School in Ngomano, Kenya Using Innovative Technology (Water Sanitation and Hygiene) - GG2465930
(Rotary Club of Brookline) – DRAFT, seeking partners. Contact Richard Segan***

This project is to provide a reliable source of clean drinking for the Clay International Secondary School, Ngomano, Kenya. The Clay School serves rural students unable to afford fees required for attendance at public high schools. The project will be in collaboration with the Rotary Club of Emali, Kenya and the Rotary Club Brookline with support from other clubs and organizations. Using an innovative technology used in other locations in Africa and North America, the proposal is to use SOURCE hydropanels that extract water vapor from the atmosphere. The warmth inside the hydropanels turns the water vapor into liquid water.

Clean drinking water via hydropanels will decrease dependency on an unreliable and increasingly stressed river resource and avoid costly import of clean drinking water from distant locations. The hydropanels have applications in locations experiencing drought or inconsistent rainfall patterns that place traditional sources of water at-risk.

***Up From Poverty – Machakos, Kenya (Economic Development)
DG Joyce Graff project – DRAFT, seeking partners***

The project will provide an opportunity for impoverished children to raise themselves and their families out of poverty, gain vocational and entrepreneurial skills, and become productive citizens.

It was observed that there were a large number of children living on the streets of Machakos, foraging for food because there was not enough food at home for themselves or their families. These children were not able to attend school due to lack of food, shoes and uniforms. This project works to provide the basics for these children, with food

for themselves and their families. It works to get the children into school and off the streets, and provide the education and training that enables them to bring themselves and their families out of poverty, gain decent employment, live dignified lives, and contribute to their community.

Benefitting? Impoverished children and families in Machakos and the adjacent region

How many? 100 students and their families (500 people)

Demographics: youth who have not completed secondary school

***Moving Health in Ghana (Maternal and Child Health) - GG2459680
RC Cambridge – DRAFT, seeking partners. Contact Karen Saltiel***

A lack of affordable medical transportation and the poor quality of roads, contribute to the high maternal mortality ratio in rural Ghana, where there are 308 deaths per 100,000 live births. Moving Health is a NGO that was created to help fill this gap.

We work with last-mile communities to design, manufacture, and implement affordable ambulances. Together, we designed the Moving Health Tricycle Ambulance, a low-cost, three-wheel vehicle that provides a safe, sustainable solution that increases access to healthcare and prioritizes local concerns. Designed for the emergency transportation of laboring mothers, our ambulance has additional space for a nurse and family member and features a raised suspension system that minimizes turbulence on rough terrain, reducing the physical risk factors of transport and supporting patients' emotional health. It also has a GPS tracking sensor, which tracks mileage, time, and other data—allowing the driver to focus on safely transporting the patient. Our ambulance solution addresses the need for emergency transportation and strengthens healthcare systems in the region, ensuring that women and their families can access healthcare services within rural communities in Ghana.

Moving health has launched 15 ambulances in 2023 in the upper west region of Ghana, showing strong health outcome improvements while working alongside the local health government. Our partnership with Rotary Club of Accra will allow us to expand the project and launch 5 more ambulances into our program.

***Uganda Water Project (Water, Sanitation and Hygiene) - GG2237250
(Rotary Club of Fitchburg East) - Pending - Seeking partners. Contact Chris Grubel***

Our project objective is to improve access to clean water in remote areas of Uganda, specifically the village Busunju. We have donated land available to build water wells in strategic locations to benefit local residents. Our plan is to build efficient and sustainable water wells to tap into resources currently unavailable to local residents. According to a Community Needs Assessment conducted by the host club 22% of residents currently get access to water through piped water, boreholes, and rain water collection systems, while the remaining residents use spring wells. 79% of the local population's main source of livelihood is subsistence farming, which makes improving access to fresh water a top priority for the area.

Educational quality in secondary education with a gender perspective in a marginal neighborhood of Guatemala (Basic Education and Literacy) - GG2569435 (Rotary Club of Westborough) – seeking partners. Contact Jorge Yarzebski

Project: Promoting educational quality in secondary education with a gender perspective in a marginal neighborhood of the capital of Guatemala

This project is 100% focused on education and addresses developing the capacity of communities to provide education to all members and reducing educational inequality between the sexes— areas on which Rotary International is institutionally focused. It collaborates with two organizations that are part of the official education system, the Secondary School “Instituto por Cooperativa Santa Rosita” (INCOOP) and the Association for Education and Culture (ASOL), which is affiliated with the Institute for its institutional strengthening. Both meet all the legal requirements and have proven experience in serving the most disadvantaged parts of Guatemala's youth.

The main problem that the project will address, is the low academic performance of INCOOP and ASOL students and the low qualification of teachers, which is expressed in poor student scores in the tests of the Ministry of Education, where in 2019, 48% passed the reading tests and no one passed the math tests. This puts INCOOP slightly above the national average of 37% for reading and at the bottom of the national average of 13.5% for mathematics.

In addition, the project addresses the inadequate technological equipment of INCOOP and ASOL, the lack of parental support for the educational process (MAPAF), the low self-esteem of girls, the orientation of female students towards care work, as well as the presence of gender stereotypes in career choices and the low understanding of the ASOL and INCOOP team on how to promote gender equality in education. These issues were identified in a community diagnosis that included interviews with key community actors, a focus group with ASOL students and parents, community mapping, and a survey of INCOOP students.

The total target group in the two years is 902 people, 672 school-age youth and 230 adults including teachers, school administrators and parents in 2025 and a projected intake of 100 new students in 2026.

Rainwater Catchment Tanks for Schools in Kambiri Kenya – (Water and Sanitation) GG2458065 RC Bedford – SUBMITTED, seeking partners. Contact Victor Tom

Provide a minimum of 1,500,000 liters of water security per year, through the production of 20 25,000 liter Rainwater Catchment Tanks at schools, in the Kambiri area. To provide hygiene and hygienic sanitation options, training, and education made possible due to water availability and the production of KEBS (Kenya Bureau of Standards) liquid soap. The primary beneficiaries will be up to 2,500 school children and due to clean water, their health will improve, their school attendance will improve and their school performance will improve.

Mobile Water Treatment trailers for Ukraine - To provide clean water from polluted water - GG2455498

(District 7910 Disaster Response grant) – SUBMITTED, seeking partners – Contact Roy Balfour

The water in Ukraine has been seriously polluted and undrinkable due to the war. The main objective is to provide mobile Water treatment equipment that can be travel to different areas

producing clean drinking water from local polluted water, to benefit the people of Ukraine, particularly those living in small towns or villages.

High Impact WASH Project led by Obuasi Rotary Club partnering with Wa, Achimota, Kumasi & Dunkwa in Ghana, West Africa – (Water and Sanitation) - GG2352766

Led by multiple clubs in Ghana. COMPLETED

Global Grant 23-52766, Water and Sanitation with High Impact in Ghana will drill 50 new wells, provide 4 small town water systems, and build 385 microflush toilets. We will administer micro-credit loans for wells and household toilets. 20 farmers and small businesses shall receive lending support to boost their trades. This will improve the economic strength of our communities. The budget is \$239,000. This project is jointly hosted by Rotary Clubs of Obuasi, Kumasi, Accra Achimota, Dunkwa and Wa in District 9104 in Ghana. Obuasi Rotary is the lead host Rotary Club. Our team will impact 39,814 lives to reach 1 million lives served.

Piyali Vocational Training Centre in West Bengal, India (Economic Development) GG1528463 (RC Worcester) – COMPLETED

The primary objectives for this global grant are as follows:

1. Provide the community members of Piyali Junction access to vocation-based training and the requisite literacy and numeracy. This training will build their capacities to maximise earning potentials and reduce household and community poverty . Training will be offered in the following vocations:

- Organic Farming
- Unarmed Security Personnel with NSDC certification and placement that will earn them employment and livelihood.
- Tailoring

2. Establish a training centre, by upgrading the existing outdoor facility with a concrete floor and a Pavilion structure without walls and paving the pathway leading to it, on the campus of Piyali Learning Centre (PLC)* where the activities will be carried out throughout the year.

*PLC is a school providing holistic and free education to first generation girl students in a remote village in West Bengal. PLC exists to empower these individuals to lift themselves out of extreme poverty and prevent associated crimes like abuse and trafficking.

District Grants

The following grants have been awarded to clubs in District 7910 for 2024-25.

North Quabbin Trails Kiosk and Performing Stage (Environment)

(RC Athol-Orange)

North Quabbin Trails Association (NQTA) is a 501(c)3 non-profit, with a long-standing trail signed professional stewardship contracting services agreement for the Red Apple Farm run by the Rose family. NQTA is looking to professionalize some of the key infrastructure base of the Red Apple 8-mile trail system while taking advantage of the tourism and eco-sustainable marketing opportunities that the Rose's have created making Red Apple Farm the #1 Agro-Tourism Center in our region with tens of thousands of visitors a year.

A Performance Stage will be built at Cutthroat Brook Tree Farm set at Waterman's Crossing. Installing a 6 x 6, 2x10 performance staging and picnic area.

Reading Nooks in Schools Without Libraries (Literacy)

(RC Changemakers of Central Massachusetts)

Our grant proposal centers around a community project to bring literacy in the form book nooks to elementary schools that were stripped of their libraries due to budget cuts a few years ago. We will be partnering with Hygge House Books, a small bookseller, in Westborough, Massachusetts, who has already installed one in a school with no library in Worcester. The book nook will be a welcoming place for children to come and choose culturally relevant books to take home and keep or share as they choose. We are looking to provide sturdy furniture and comfy seating along with a couple of bookshelves for 2-3 schools along with books to fill the shelves. By providing these materials, children will be able to bring literacy into their own homes where they can share it with the others in the home. All of the books will be high quality, new or very gently used as well in addition to being culturally relevant. It is a fact that children need books where the characters look like themselves and their families. By working with Hygge House Books we will be able to access not only their knowledge but wholesale books as well.

WCC Pollinator Habitat (Environment)

(RC Blackstone Valley)

The Blackstone Valley Rotary will design and build a pollinator habitat located at the Whitinsville Community Center (WCC) in Northbridge, MA.

Food Insecurity - Helping Residents, Students and Veterans (Disease prevention)

(RC Wellesley)

Food Insecurity among our residents, students and veterans is a growing concern. Recent studies show that 29% of American families suffer from insufficient food.

With this grant, we will work with the Village Church and MassBay Community College to provide approximately 12000 high quality meals to local residents, MassBay students and veterans..

Working with the Village Church, we will purchase food, and with members of our club and the Village Church prepare, cook and deliver the meals.

This is a highly efficient process since each meal will cost about \$3.50 to produce and is valued at 5 to 6 times that cost if purchased through a restaurant. Our goal is the \$5000 provided by our club and the District grant will result in \$25,000 to \$30,000 of value for meals delivered.

Rain Barrel Environmental Project (Environment)

(RC Framingham)

The Rotary Club of Framingham will work with the Environmental Club of Framingham High School to buy, paint and distribute rain barrels. Rain barrels connected to downspouts etc, conserve water that can be used for plants and irrigation and also limit storm runoff that can pick up pollutants from the landscape and go into rivers and streams. The rain barrels will be painted by FHS students according to environmental themes, promoting good stewardship of the environment. There will be a contest and then distributed in the city.

Lounge 250: Midtown West Concord (Economic development)

(RC Concord)

The Rotary Club of Concord proposes hosting three events at the Concord Council on Aging, starting in October 2024. We will host and serve three dinner/music event at the COA, which will include performances by local, professional musicians and catered dinner, with decorations and mocktails. The goal is to alleviate isolation in our senior community, as well as to expose everyone to live music. The health benefits of lives music cannot be underscored enough -- from reduced blood pressure to increased dopamine, music indeed soothes all of us. Approximately 50 seniors will be served at each event, which will allow them all to dress up, share a meal, socialize and hear live music. The theme will be to replicate a Manhattan "lounge" with drinks, food and music. We're bringing midtown to West Concord!

Est: full budget \$6,000. Requesting \$3,000

Westborough Farmer's Market Healthy Food Program (Economic development)

(RC Westborough)

Now in its fifth year, The Westborough Famer's Market is expanding programs to encourage healthy eating and community connection.

The market will introduce a Power of Produce (POP) Program for children under 12 and senior citizens. This program will encourage individuals to try nutritional fruits and veggies. Each child who signs up will receive \$3 weekly, and the seniors will receive \$5 weekly in POP bucks to use at the various farmers' booths.

To further promote a healthy lifestyle for our diverse community, the market will also accept SNAP. In addition, the market will work closely with the Westborough Food Pantry and Little Free Pantry to support neighbors in need. Our goal is for the Market to become a weekly family event that provides a service to all Westborough citizens while building partnership with other community service organizations.

The requested grant will cover 18 consecutive weeks of POP vouchers for seniors and children. We estimate 100 participants per week; participants come from Westborough and several surrounding towns (Northborough, Southborough, Grafton, Shrewsbury).

Moreover, the grant money will be applied to purchase items to implement the programs effectively. These items include, but are not limited to a tent and iPad for administering the POP & SNAP program.

***Turkey and ham for senior centers at thanksgiving and Christmas (Economic development)
(RC Wachusetts Area)***

We provide ham for Christmas and turkey for Thanksgiving to senior centers in our area to help them out with seniors who may not be able to afford.

***Build-a-bed (Maternal and child health)
(RC Westford)***

Partner with a local organization to build beds for use by children or adults. The price of one bed is approximately \$250. The goal would be to build 20 beds for a total cost of \$5,000.

Funds will be raised from the community, the district, and the Westford club. The project will be carried out likely in the spring of 2025 with volunteers from the Westford club and surrounding community.

***Support Veterans to improve their mental stability (Maternal and child health)
(RC Montachusetts Area)***

Provide support and build relations with the local veterans within our community. Provide resources to local veterans to improve their quality of life.

Provide materials that will support their mental stability such as Christmas Trees and flowers for special days.

Provide service opportunities including but not limited to: loading x trees, distributing trees to local vets & delivering flowers to the veterans.

Volunteer at the local fall festival that is run at a local garden center.

***Sears Field Conservation (Environment)
(RC Weston-Wayland)***

We would like to continue with our with our Sears Field Pollinator project. In Sears Field we are restoring 1.4 acres of invasive infested land into a pollinator meadow and hope to continue with our plantings. The field takes an extensive amount of volunteer work and funding. This is also the one of our higher cost projects at this time.

***Kairos Spring Farm (Disease prevention)
(RC Nashoba Valley)***

The American Journal of Preventative Medicine reported that in 2020 depression was prevalent among nearly 1 in 10 Americans and almost 1 in 5 adolescents and young adults.

A 2021 article in the National Library of Medicine confirmed that nature exposure improved cognitive function, brain activity, blood pressure, mental health, physical activity, and sleep. "Results from experimental studies provide evidence of protective effects of exposure to natural environments on mental health outcomes and cognitive function.

In an effort to dull the pain of overwhelming emotions; grief, anger, depression, anxiety...many turn to substances. Self-medicating can take the form of non substances as well such as addictions to shopping, sex, eating, self harm and thrill seeking. None of these efforts to "feel better" have sustainable effects and lead to further challenges.

Our Club is fortunate to have a non-profit Program in Stow that services youth and veterans with Mental health challenges. We decided to partner with Kairos Spring far as our district Grant project this year.

Suitcases to Foster Dignity (Maternal and child health)

(RC Fitchburg)

Many foster children sometimes leave their homes and are not prepared. When they are placed in a foster home or move from one foster home to another, their possessions are in a large black garbage bag or a bag with an agency name, which is demoralizing. Our Rotary Clubs, Fitchburg and Fitchburg East, in conjunction with local agencies plan to provide these children suitcases to foster their dignity. Our club plans are to purchase suitcases and fill them with the necessary toiletries, pajamas/clothes, stuffed animal, etc. There are approx. 200 foster children in Fitchburg and we hope to bring a smile and dignity to as many of these children as we can.

Hope for the Hungry 2024 (Maternal and child health)

(RC Bedford, Merrimack Valley, Billerica, Chelmsford, Concord, Westford)

This multi-club (6), multi-district project (2), partnering with Meals of Hope, will package close to 40,000 meals. These dry-packaged meals will consist of beans, rice, protein, dry vegetables and vitamins and will address food insecurity (over 30% of MA residents suffer from food insecurity) in the Middlesex County and surrounding areas. Not only will the project address immediate needs in our area food banks and the Middlesex Community College food bank, but it will raise critical awareness of this need right in our own backyard. (requesting \$6,000 DG and raising \$9,000 for \$15,000 total budget).

Nutrition 68 2024-2025 (Maternal and child health)

(RC Northborough)

Sustainability has been the goal of our N68 program since 2019. Each year our Club has worked to help address food insecurity that some school children experience between the free lunch they receive in school on Friday and the free lunch they receive in school on Monday. We fill back packs that children carry home to provide them with nutritious meals for the weekend. This year we hope to reach our goal as we work through a plan to make N68 truly a community based and supported program.

Handicap Toilets for West Brookfield Common Events (Water and Sanitation)

(RC Brookfields)

To provide the Town of West Brookfield with one ADA compliant porta potty for the Concerts on the Common series of events on the Town Common. The Town has received complaints from handicapped citizens regarding the lack of services to those that need them. Individuals with disabilities must have equal opportunities to attend and enjoy public events and spaces. This project will provide one summer of relief while the Town finds a permanent solution to the problem.

St. Paul's Soup Kitchen (Economic development)

(RC Lowell)

St. Paul's Soup Kitchen serves hot evening meals five days per week all year to the homeless and anyone else who needs a meal. They typically serve 120-190 people per day. They seek sponsors to provide food, meal preparation and to serve the meal. We would like to sponsor up to three meals including 29 October and 31 December 2024 (these are the fifth Tuesdays in the months) plus an additional date in the spring of 2025. Each meal will cost approximately \$1000. We are seeking co-sponsors from nearby Rotary Clubs. I, the sponsoring club contact, have been active with St. Paul's through my church, so I know their processes.
